

## SECTION 12.4 WAAHI TAPU RESOURCE MANAGEMENT UNIT

### 12.4.1 INTRODUCTION

The Resource Management Act contains specific obligations in relation to Tangata Whenua. It identifies as a matter of national importance the relationship of Maori and their culture and traditions with their ancestral lands, water, sites, Waahi Tapu, and other taonga. The Resource Management Act also states that the principles of the Treaty of Waitangi must be taken into account when managing the use, development and protection of natural and physical resources.

Traditional Maori culture and values are closely linked to the environment. Land confers dignity and rank, is the resting place for the dead, a spiritual base for traditional beliefs and a heritage for future generations. Tangata Whenua have expressed concern for the quality and condition of resources of significance to them and these are identified in the District Plan. It is these areas that are Waahi Tapu. Tangata Whenua and Council have endeavoured to identify Waahi Tapu in the District, though there is a reluctance by Tangata Whenua to identify the exact location of some Waahi Tapu sites because of the need to protect their sacredness. Accordingly not all Waahi Tapu in the District have been identified, although it is only those that have been identified which are protected by the provisions.

Waahi Tapu sites include:

- old pa sites, excavations and middens (pa tawhito)
- old burial grounds and caves (ana tupapaku)
- current cemeteries (urupa)
- battlefields (wahi pakanga)
- sacred rocks, trees or springs (nga toka, rakau tapu)
- water courses, swamps, lakes and their edges (waipuna, awa, roto)

The Council has recognised that the effective protection of Waahi Tapu is dependent on the mutual goodwill of both landowners and Tangata Whenua. Accordingly the District Plan seeks to facilitate the opportunity for this to occur as part of the subdivision and development process.

A Maori legend related to the ancient Heretaunga waiata `E to e te Ra speaks of Te Whata a Terehunga, the name of a special storehouse elevated on a single pole to protect its sacred contents from the "gnashing teeth of hungry dogs". The Council's Waahi Tapu policy will act as a modern te whata or elevated storehouse, as a protective mechanism of these special sites, by identifying and collating this information for Council reference thus preventing the "gnashing teeth" of uninformed developments on these specific areas.

### 12.4.2 RESOURCE MANAGEMENT ISSUES

- ***Waahi Tapu sites have special cultural and spiritual significance to Tangata Whenua.***

Waahi Tapu sites play an important part in the culture and traditions of Tangata Whenua. They refer to places held in reverence according to tribal custom and history. In achieving the purpose of the Resource Management Act and the matters of national importance under Section 6(e), the Hastings District Council will recognise and provide for this and respect the significance of Waahi Tapu to Tangata Whenua.

- ***While the exact location of some Waahi Tapu sites needs to remain confidential to protect their sacredness, protection can only be given to those sites which have been identified by iwi for inclusion in the District Plan***

Iwi have been successful in protecting Waahi Tapu sites in the past by keeping their nature and location secret. While the Hastings District Council recognises the reluctance of some

Tangata Whenua to reveal the exact location of some Waahi Tapu sites, only those sites whose nature and location have been identified by Iwi are protected under the Waahi Tapu provisions of the District Plan. Tangata Whenua and Council will therefore need to pursue non-regulatory methods outside of the Plan to protect as far as possible Waahi Tapu which are not identified in the District Plan.

- ***Building platforms, structures, provision of services, access or earthworks may destroy, damage or modify Waahi Tapu.***

Activities which disturb the ground pose a significant threat to Waahi Tapu. If the general location of Waahi Tapu can be signalled, then developers and landowners will be able to plan development in a manner that minimises or avoids disturbance of Waahi Tapu. The co-operation and assistance of local Tangata Whenua will assist this process.

- ***Private development rights may be affected by the presence of Waahi Tapu.***

The possible presence of Waahi Tapu on private land, particularly where the specific location of the Waahi Tapu cannot be, or is not identified, can affect potential development opportunities. In providing for the protection of Waahi Tapu, the needs of both Tangata Whenua and landowners will need to be taken into account, and it will require mutual respect and co-operation between the parties.

#### 12.4.3 OBJECTIVES

- *WTO1 To recognise waahi tapu sites in the Hastings District as being of cultural significance to nga hapu through whakapapa and ensure their protection from damage, modification or destruction from land use activities.*
- *WTO2 To promote the protection of waahi tapu sites in a way that accounts for the customary practices of nga hapu.*
- *WTO3 To encourage the partnership of the Council, landowners and nga hapu in the management of waahi tapu sites.*

#### 12.4.4 POLICIES

- **WTP1 Identify, in consultation with nga hapu, land within the District which contains Waahi Tapu sites.**

##### Explanation

Landowners affected by the identification of a new waahi tapu site or a variation to an existing waahi tapu site on their property will be notified as part of the identification process and as part of any proposed District Plan Changes.

Where land in the District contains waahi tapu sites that have been notified to the Council, these are identified in Appendix 12.4-1 and shown on the Planning Maps. These maps are designed to enable the Council to quickly and easily identify where there are, waahi tapu sites on land which may be affected by proposed activities, and when there is a need to notify nga hapu.

- **WTP2 Notify and consult with nga hapu on applications received by the Council for Subdivision Consents and Resource Consents relating to land containing a waahi tapu site identified in Appendix 12.4-1 and shown on the Planning Maps where appropriate.**

Explanation

Where Council receives applications for Discretionary Activity subdivision consents, which separate an identified waahi tapu into two or more separate titles or resource consents for activities located on actual waahi tapu sites, the Council will notify the hapu for resource consent applications where required. For PIMs, the Tangata Whenua will be invited to provide to the Council, any relevant information it wishes to have included about the sites on the PIMs. For subdivision consents and resource consents the Council will invite Tangata Whenua to work with the Council, and with the individual developers, to advise them on methods that could be used to ensure that the proposed subdivision, structures or activities will not damage, modify or destroy the affected Waahi Tapu sites. The Council may then, as a result of this consultation, place certain conditions on the subdivision or land use consent, with regard to the nature, location, design or scale of the proposed subdivision or land use activity, including access or structures on the land.

- **WTP3 Establish a schedule of key hapu / tangata whenua representatives who will be notified or consulted on applications received for subdivision consents or resource consents on land containing Waahi Tapu.**

Explanation

A schedule containing the names and addresses of authorised contact persons who will be notified or consulted about applications for subdivisions or land use activities on land containing Waahi Tapu which are associated with their Marae, is available from the District Council. This will ensure that the relevant hapu / tangata whenua representatives are contacted.

- **WTP4 Notify and consult with the New Zealand Historic Places Trust on applications received by the Council for Subdivision Consents and Resources Consents relating to land containing a waahi tapu site identified in Appendix 12.4-1 and identified in the New Zealand Historic Places Trust's register of waahi tapu and waahi tapu areas.**

Explanation

The Resource Management Act provides a requirement for territorial authorities to have regard to any relevant entry in the Historic Places Register to the extent that its contents have a bearing on the resource management issues of the district.

The Historic Places Act 1993 also contains a requirement under Sections 32D & 33 that Councils must have particular regard to any recommendations given by the Historic Places Trust in regard to measures the council should take to assist in the conservation and protection of waahi tapu.

As such the District Council will notify and consult with the New Zealand Historic Places trust for guidance on the appropriate measures to assist in the conservation and protection of waahi tapu listed in the Historic Places Trust's register of waahi tapu and waahi tapu areas potentially affected by resource consent applications.

<b>12.4.5 METHODS</b>
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These Objectives and Policies will be implemented through the following Methods.

- **Hastings District Plan**

Land Owner / Hapu Agreements

In some instances landowners and hapu with kaitiaki over waahi tapu may reach agreement after a full cultural audit has been on that site as to what type of activities can be appropriately undertaken on the site without threatening the integrity of the waahi tapu. The Whakatu Coldstores site (Lot 2 DP24935) is one such example of this where a full cultural audit with matakite walkover was undertaken in relation to a resource consent for a new building. As a result of the findings of the cultural audit the hapu is satisfied that further building development on site provides little threat to the waahi tapu, accordingly such building development has been accorded permitted activity status. This does not however apply to other properties covered by W20 as they have not been subject to the same level of investigation.

That in the case of W38 historical records (including an archaeological site record V1/220 not specific to an exact area, although appears to align closely to W38) and oral traditions suggest that there are burials and urupa in the wider area. The land has been modified over time by horticultural activities, with extensive earthworks over W38 from the 1980's and early 1990's to remove the sand hills previously present. There is no surface evidence of burial sites, koiwi or urupa present today. A matakite walkover was undertaken on the land identified on the District Plan maps as W38 in July 2009, which did not identify any koiwi on that particular piece of land. For the above reasons this piece of land is subject to less regulation as a waahi tapu site. Agricultural, horticultural and viticultural activities are permitted given that the site has been extensively modified and previously used for horticulture. Any building activity would be subject to the Waahi Tapu resource consent process. Reference to W38 therefore remains to acknowledge the historic and cultural significance of the site and wider area.

#### Waahi Tapu RMU (Section 12.4)

The Waahi Tapu section includes a list of waahi tapu within the Hastings District which Council has identified the opportunity to protect and manage, through the use of objectives, policies and rules, ensuring that consultation takes place when an identified Waahi Tapu site is affected by a proposed land use activity.

#### Riparian Land Management and Public Access DWA (Section 13.9)

This section of the District Plan identifies those areas of the Hastings District where Council has identified the opportunity to provide esplanade reserves and alternative mechanisms for the protection of waterbodies throughout the District to ensure the sustainable management of them and public access to them.

#### Indigenous Vegetation and Habitats of Indigenous Fauna DWA (Section 13.10)

This section of the District Plan areas of significant indigenous vegetation and habitats of indigenous fauna in the District where Council has identified that it will provide incentives and rules for the protection of them.

#### Subdivision and Land Development (Section 15.1)

This section of the District Plan manages containing waahi tapu, ensuring building platforms, servicing infrastructure and any development recognises and ensures that waahi tapu is protected from modification or any further disturbance.

- **Hastings District Council Information Databases**

Including information held on the Council's Geographic Information System (GIS), to identify the general location of Waahi Tapu sites in the Hastings District.

- **Consultation**

The Council will work with iwi and hapu through the Hastings District Council: Maori Joint Committee and the Strategic Advisor Culture and Heritage (Iwi Liaison Officer) to establish contact persons for each hapu, through which consultation will take place. A list of contact persons will be held by the Council and will be available to the public for inspection. Council

will notify the relevant Iwi/Hapu contact person (as known to the Council) of any Subdivision Consent, or Resource Consent application it receives which affects any Waahi Tapu site(s) identified in Appendix 12.4-1 and shown on the Planning Maps, within 5 working days of receiving the application.

- **New Zealand Historic Places Act**

In addition to the Waahi Tapu sites identified in Appendix 12.4-1 and shown on the Planning Maps, there are also a number of Waahi Tapu and Archaeological sites registered under the New Zealand Historic Places Act. The Historic Places Act 1993 covers all archaeological sites whether registered or identified in the Plan. An authority is required under that Act to destroy, damage or modify an archaeological site. An archaeological site under the Historic Places Act 1993 is defined as: a place associated with pre-1900 human activity, where there may be evidence relating to the history of New Zealand.

- **Building Act**

Under the Building Act 2004, Council is obliged to advise the Historic Places Trust of any application for a Project Information Memorandum (PIM) within 5 days of receipt of the application, where the application affects any registered historic place, historic area, waahi tapu or waahi tapu area. The Council is required to include in every PIM any information made available to it by the Trust.

- **Land Information Memorandum/Project Information Memorandum**

Within an identified waahi tapu, LIMs and PIMs that are issued will indicate that the area is a known waahi tapu which is a site of significance to Maori, and that the property owner should take this into account when considering future development on the site.

- **Education**

The Council will prepare material for the public that outlines the nature, and importance of Waahi Tapu to iwi, likely places of location, the process of consultation, and which simple steps landowners can take to avoid, or minimise the impact of Waahi Tapu on their land. The intention of the process will be to minimise any adverse fears that may exist about land with Waahi Tapu identified upon it.

- **Monitoring**

Monitoring will be undertaken to ensure that the methods outlined above continue to achieve the Objectives and Policies of the District Plan. Monitoring of the conditions of resource consents will also be undertaken by Council in accordance with Section 35 of the Act, and the Resource Consent Monitoring Strategy.

- **Integrated Management and Information Exchange**

To occur between all parties involved in the management and protection of waahi tapu within the region and particularly where the protection of waahi tapu is a cross boundary issue. This includes the landowners, tangata whenua, the affected local authorities such as Hastings District Council, the Hawke's Bay Regional Council and any other affected parties where necessary. While the Hawke's Bay Regional Council is responsible for the beds of rivers, streams and lakes, this section applies to the protection of those rivers, streams and lakes that are waahi tapu.

- **Financial Instruments**

Financial incentives including rates relief, waiving or refund of consent application fees will be utilised to encourage protection of cultural heritage including waahi tapu where

appropriate. This recognises land owners and developers who provide for the protection of waahi tapu on their properties and within the District. These incentives will be phased in through the Annual Plan process and will be awarded at Council's discretion in accordance with any conditions that it chooses to apply. Applications need to be made to the Council to determine eligibility to qualify for any one of the financial incentives provided for in the respective plans.

Rates Relief<sup>1</sup> totally or in partial – For properties or the affected parts thereof, provided the identified waahi tapu is maintained and suitable legal and physical protection measures are taken to maintain the integrity of the site in perpetuity.

Waiving of fees<sup>2</sup> – Consent application fees for an activity on site(s) where a waahi tapu is identified and mitigating measures including physical and/or legal protection of the waahi tapu is undertaken.

Refund of resource consent fees - Where landowners obtain resource consent recognising that the activity applied for solely promotes the enhancement and protection of the waahi tapu environment benefitting the wider community and that the effects of the stated activity will have no adverse impacts on the listed waahi tapu.

#### 12.4.6 ANTICIPATED OUTCOMES

It is anticipated that the following specific outcomes will be achieved.

- Recognition of the cultural importance of Waahi Tapu sites to Tangata Whenua.
- Protection of listed Waahi Tapu sites from the effects of land use activities.
- Active participation of Tangata Whenua in the management of their ancestral land and resources.
- Identification of places of special significance to the Tangata Whenua, and the maintenance of their values.

#### 12.4.7 RULES

**The Waahi Tapu Resource Management Unit shall be complied with first, before any rules for the relevant underlying zone or District Wide Activity apply. Activities shall be assessed as a particular status under the rules of this RMU (e.g. permitted or discretionary) before they can be assessed and the relevant Rules and Standard(s) and Terms of the underlying Zoning or District Wide Activity apply.**

##### 12.4.7.1 PERMITTED ACTIVITIES

(a) The following activities shall be Permitted activities:

- ANY MAINTENANCE AND ENHANCEMENT OF A LISTED WAAHI TAPU IDENTIFIED IN APPENDIX 12.4-1, AND ANY ACTIVITY WHICH COMPLIES WITH THE GENERAL PERFORMANCE STANDARDS AND TERMS OF THIS RMU IN SECTION 12.4.8.1 BELOW.

- ANY MAINTENANCE, REPLACEMENT OR REPAIR OF EXISTING NETWORK UTILITIES INVOLVING WAAHI TAPU IDENTIFIED IN APPENDIX 12.4-1 WHICH COMPLIES WITH THE GENERAL PERFORMANCE STANDARDS AND TERMS OF THIS RMU IN SECTION 12.4.8.1 BELOW.
- ANY ACTIVITY ON LOT 2 DP 24935 (W20) THAT IS OTHERWISE PERMITTED BY THE DISTRICT PLAN EXCEPT FOR:
  - EXCAVATIONS DEEPER THAN 4M BELOW CURRENT GROUND LEVEL
  - BUILDINGS WITHIN 20M OF THE BOUNDARY WITH THE CLIVE RIVER
- THE FOLLOWING USES IN RESPECT OF W38 ON LOT 1 22675, 238 STATE HIGHWAY 2, HASTINGS:
  - AGRICULTURAL, HORTICULTURAL & VITICULTURAL ACTIVITIES NOT INVOLVING THE ERECTION OF BUILDINGS.

#### 12.4.7.2 DISCRETIONARY ACTIVITIES

- a) The following activities shall be Discretionary Activities, and will be assessed against, but not restricted to those matters identified in the Assessment Criteria in Section 12.4.9 of the Plan, and the Objectives and Policies of the Zone.
- ANY ACTIVITY NOT PROVIDED FOR AS A PERMITTED ACTIVITY AND WHICH CANNOT MEET THE GENERAL PERFORMANCE STANDARDS AND TERMS OF THIS RMU IN SECTION 12.4.8 BELOW
- b) In addition to any Assessment Criteria contained in the respective zone or District Wide Activity Rules for assessing resource consent applications for the above activities, where they are otherwise Controlled or Discretionary, the Assessment Criteria in Section 12.4.9 shall also apply.

### 12.4.8 GENERAL PERFORMANCE STANDARDS AND TERMS

The following General Performance Standards shall apply:

#### 12.4.8.1 GENERAL STANDARDS FOR ALL ACTIVITIES

##### PROPERTIES CONTAINING WAAHI TAPU IN APPENDIX 12.4-1

Any activity involving the excavation, modification or disturbance of the ground containing a Waahi Tapu site identified in Appendix 12.4-1 and shown on the Planning Maps shall not destroy damage or modify the actual Waahi Tapu site.

Outcome

*Waahi Tapu sites identified throughout the District will be protected against activities which have the potential to destroy, damage or modify them.*

#### 12.4.9 ASSESSMENT CRITERIA – DISCRETIONARY ACTIVITIES

##### Explanation of Assessment Criteria:

For Discretionary Activities, the following identify those matters which Council may assess the activity against, but assessment is not however restricted to these matters.

- a. The significance of Waahi Tapu site(s) on the land, including its value to Tangata Whenua
- b. The extent to which the proposed activity may destroy, damage or further modify the Waahi Tapu site(s), particularly in relation to:
  - (i) the nature and scale of the proposed activity
  - (ii) the design, layout or location of the activity on the site, including associated building platforms, vehicle access and services on the site.
- c. Methods to protect the Waahi Tapu site(s), including any recommendations from consultation with Tangata Whenua and (where appropriate) the NZ Historic Places Trust.
- d. The degree to which the listed waahi tapu has already been modified.
- e. Whether the proposed activity respects the significance of the waahi tapu and will not visually dominate the waahi tapu.
- f. Whether the contents of a site contribute towards its significance as waahi tapu and whether regard should also be had to conserving those contents.

**Hapu:** Federation of whanau.

**Herenga waka:** Waka mooring area.

**Koiwi:** Bone; corpse; descendants (plural); skeleton.

**Mahinga kai:** Food gathering.

**Mana whenua:** Authority over the land.

**Marae:** Occupation site, village centre.



**Pa:** Occupation site.

**Pito:** Umbilical cord.

**Puna:** Spring [waipuna: water spring (springs are water)]

**Rakau pito:** Pito tree.

**Rakau tapu:** Sacred tree.

**Rangatira:** Noble person.

**Roto:** Lake.

**Tangata whenua:** Local people.

**Taonga:** Treasure, something of particular value that is either made or natural (environmental).

**Tauranga waka:** Waka launching area.

**Toka:** Rock.

**Toka tohi:** Ceremonial stone, boundary marker.
