

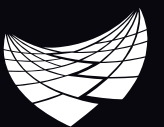

## Communities – it is such an unassuming word for the vibrant and passionate neighbourhoods that make up our district.

This month we are releasing a video about some of our communities and the heights they are achieving by getting together and making plans – real plans, with concrete goals that reach to the heart of their needs and aspirations.

Council is working with neighbourhoods to help the people in them work out what it is they need, and how those needs can be met. The premise is that the people who make up our communities know their strengths and issues better than anyone, so they are in the best position to know what needs doing.

It is called community-led planning. Another dry phrase that fails to encapsulate just how magical the process is.

It is about helping communities set up their own planning systems, their own structures and their own time frames –

rather than the traditional way which saw councils deciding what was needed and where.

Council started working with Camberley in 2004. Now, 14 years later, nine plans are on the board, some into their second and third iteration; others just starting. There are some great successes, too many to name here, but they include the total revamp of Flaxmere Park, a new community centre in Camberley, a vibrant community garden in Havelock North, and a new cycle lane across the Clive Bridge.

These are all projects that Council would have got to eventually but, with the input and help from the individual communities, we have been able to tackle many things on many fronts at the same time.

To celebrate, and to have a resource to help communities thinking about doing their own plans, we have put together a video and booklet on the process.

But this is not a boring process video – it is about our people, young and old, showing you just what is possible. Called Making Magic, the video is being officially launched next week, after which time it will be on Council's website and I hope you will all take a few minutes to watch it. It really is magic.

### Fashion and food are on a collision course – in a good way.

An action packed night is promised at this year's edible fashion extravaganza, with Auckland-based circus theatre company The Dust Palace announced as entertainment.

The Hastings Pak 'n' Save Edible Fashion Awards, now in their 11th year, will hit the stage on June 11.

"This year's theme is 'Fantastical', so we're expecting amazing garments," says Hastings Arts and Culture Trust chairwoman and councillor Sandra Hazelhurst.

The event has grown into a firmly embedded highlight of the Hawke's Bay calendar, attracting entries from schools, tertiary institutions and business from across the region and beyond.

"As the size of the event has grown, so has the quality of entries, with 2016 expected to bring an even greater array of unique, exciting and colourful designs," says Ms Hazelhurst.

The finalists' costumes will star in the evening extravaganza, at Showgrounds Hawke's Bay.

Event manager Odette Bowyer says this year's ceremony will not disappoint. "As always, the theme will be incorporated into the evening extravaganza where finalists showcase their creations to the public. With such a fantastical theme to work with, we have created an incredible pageant. Expect to be wowed."

Securing The Dust Palace is a huge coup. "They combine amazing agility and strength with stunning choreography and are the perfect accompaniment to the fantastical creations which will be modelled on the stage – it's going to be an incredible night."

The Dust Palace formed a special affinity with Hawke's Bay when their first professional theatre show was staged at the Hawke's Bay Opera House in 2010. While they have returned to perform in the Bay on several subsequent occasions, their last performance was four years ago. "We've grown and changed and developed so much since then, we can't wait to come and share the new Dust Palace with the Hawke's Bay public," says The Dust Place co-director Eve Gordon.

At the heart of the Hastings Pak 'n' Save Edible Fashion Awards is local sponsorship which this year has enabled the organisers to waive the entry fee for designers. Many of the sponsors have had a long association with the Awards including naming sponsor, Hastings Pak 'n' Save, which has supported the event since its inception.

Sponsors see the awards as an ideal opportunity to align themselves with an established and popular Hawke's Bay event. Among them is Hastings District Council which has extended its support by agreeing to become a category sponsor under its Keep Hastings Beautiful banner.

"This is the only creative design show of its kind in Hawke's Bay and judging by the high level of support and record of number of entries, it's set to grow even bigger in coming years."

For those wanting their creations up on stage in lights, there are just 25 days left to get their entries in.

The details of the categories will be unveiled at an official launch, however Council can say that there will categories for both residential and commercial, with the winners decided based on street appeal.

With entries opening on August 1, gardeners have three months to plan something spectacular.

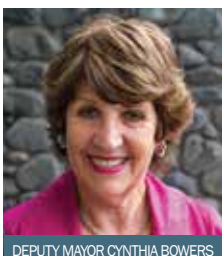
## What we're talking about

There are just a few days left to have your say on a bunch of things. Council is consulting on the plan for the year (the Annual Plan). There is a lot in the plan including Council's main projects for the year, but one of the most topical decisions is how residents want to pay for parking in the central city – by putting money in a meter or paying an extra charge on rates.

We are also consulting on a new one stop bylaw, which is consolidating all Council's bylaws into one easy to access document. There are changes within the bylaws, which Council is welcoming input into.

Consultation on the Dogs Policy and the Dogs bylaw is also on the table, with changes made to remove no longer relevant material and forms (the latter will sit outside the documents), and to better align with the Dog Control Act.

All of these consultations opened on April 2 and close on May, giving people four days to have their say. # New life and name for the domain

The pavilion was designed by Hastings architect Eric Phillips and opened in 1938. Until Karanema Drive was pushed through the original cricket field, the building provided a fine look out over the action. Now it is considered to be isolated and has limited use. The building was upgraded in 2011, and includes toilets, showers, kitchen, storeroom and main hall.

## Fundraising for the moving of the Havelock North Cricket Pavilion will kick off in earnest this month, as work on the overall Havelock North Domain upgrade gets started.

With its new look, the domain will also get a new name: Havelock North Village Green. Locally it had long been referred to as the village green, and the public has asked that the name be formalised.

The public funding drive, to raise \$150,000 of the \$300,000 needed to move the pavilion, is being spear-headed on two fronts by Havelock North resident Andy Coltart and the Havelock North Business Association. The other \$150,000 is included in the Annual Plan, with Council due to make a decision in June on whether it will cover that amount.

The moving of the pavilion is the 'icing on the cake' of an already budgeted \$1.5 million upgrade of the domain.

It is hoped the work will start this month, with Havelock North Plunket moving temporarily off site to its Hastings office. If all goes well, the project should be completed by summer.

The upgrade was consulted on last year and the money is already included in the Hastings District Council budget.

The plan for the park includes building a new playground with a children's water play area, sun shades, a revamped skate area designed for small children, paths, and new seating and tables.

The development of the park is a "once in a generation" project which will see the domain become the true heart and connector within the village, says Committee chairman and councillor, Wayne Bradshaw.

It had been intended to leave the pavilion where it is, however the community asked that it be moved to a more central position. If funding is found for the move, it will face into the park, include public toilets with a separate entrance, and be fronted with a large paved area suitable for holding markets or other outdoor events that are better on a hard surface.

There is a great deal of interest in the project within the community, particularly the re-siting of the historic Cricket Pavilion, says councillor Sandra Hazlehurst.

"It's about creating a community space out of the beautiful historic building. From the moment the idea was presented to relocate the beautiful historic pavilion to create a focal point in the redeveloped village green, the community has embraced the idea.

"The pavilion will become a gathering place for meetings, a hub from which to run events and concerts, and provide a new home for community organisations and groups like Plunket and the Toy library."

Mr Bradshaw says the project will draw a number of public buildings together, to form a cultural core for Havelock North.

"This really is exciting. Once finished, the church, the pavilion, the Havelock North Function Centre and the library will all face into this communal space, and the opening up of the pools will bring them into the domain. This has huge potential to become the equivalent of the traditional village green, a gathering and event space for all of our community.

"Let's face it, what other small to medium town has such a magnificent green space right in its heart and we're now in a position to really make the most of it."

## Park pundits are winners

Under-12s were challenged to grab an adult, and get around as many of Hastings' 37 playgrounds as possible, get photos of themselves on the play equipment, and send them in to council.

The Te Whaiti brothers bolted in – getting photos at 23 of the playgrounds. But it was not as easy as it might have been. The family set out to complete the task over Easter weekend; and it rained every day.

That did not put the three boys, Westen, 7, Isaac, 6, and Christian, 2, off though, said mum Theresa Te Whaiti. "Sometimes it would look okay, the boys would jump out of the car and it would start pouring."

But it was worth it, she said, providing a real education on what was available for children in the district.

The family visited a bunch of play areas outside of their normal neighbourhood go-to play spaces, Windsor Park and William

Nelson Park.

Among those they had not been to before were the Flaxmere parks, Evers-Swindell Reserve in Clive, and Te Awanga.

"They really liked Te Awanga; it has quite different play equipment out there. The whole thing was like a treasure hunt and a great incentive to get out and look at some of the parks we hadn't been too," said Mrs Te Whaiti.

The inaugural Australasian Parks Week ran from March 3 to 9. Run by the Parks Forum, the aim is to promote parks and the important role they play in contributing to health, happy and strong communities.

The boys won bikes to the value of \$500, enough to buy new bikes for two of the youngsters who had grown out of theirs, and a helmet for the third.

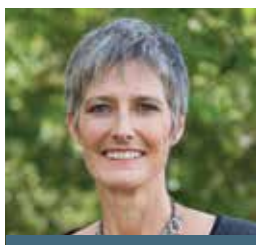
