

Hastings reaccredited as a Safe Community!

Hastings has been re-accredited as a Safe Community, six years on from first being designated an International Safe Community in 2013.

Over the last six years much work has gone into creating and sustaining supportive and connected communities, safe homes, safe roads, safe public spaces and reducing the effects of addiction-related harm in Hastings.

When the council first signed the Safe Community Agreement in 2013 it had seven coalition partners today that number has grown to 29 coalition partners. While the reaccreditation does not mean that Hastings district will always be safe from injury and violence, it does mean that there is a robust coalition of key government and community stakeholders working across a range of sectors who are committed to reducing harm and improving community safety.

The re-accreditation process was an opportunity to celebrate the work of our coalition partners in the community. The review team were taken on a tour of the district to see first-hand the work the agencies were doing to achieve the goals of a Safer Community. This included installing free smoke alarms in homes, setting up Neighbourhood Support groups, exercise classes for seniors to help with fall prevention, gambling recovery services, and road safety promotion.

Community resilience planning

The Hawke's Bay Civil Defence Emergency Management Group community engagement team has been working with Hastings communities to help them prepare for emergencies, running resilience planning sessions in Clive and the Cape Coast.

In a major emergency, your community may be on its own for the first few hours, or even days. But you won't be alone - you'll be with your family, friends, co-workers or neighbours. A community resilience plan brings community members together, to help coordinate and speed up how they'll look after each other after an emergency.

Our emergency service partners see the effects of mental health in our society on a daily basis. Often this constant exposure to emotional and tragic events causes their own to suffer from mental health issues as well.

The event, a 100km relay run, was a way for us to promote awareness of mental health issues. Starting at the Bay View Fire Station, runners followed the Hawke's Bay iWay network past all the fire stations in the area, finishing in Hastings.

All proceeds from the event went to STAROS, which runs support groups for individuals and families that have been affected by suicide.
