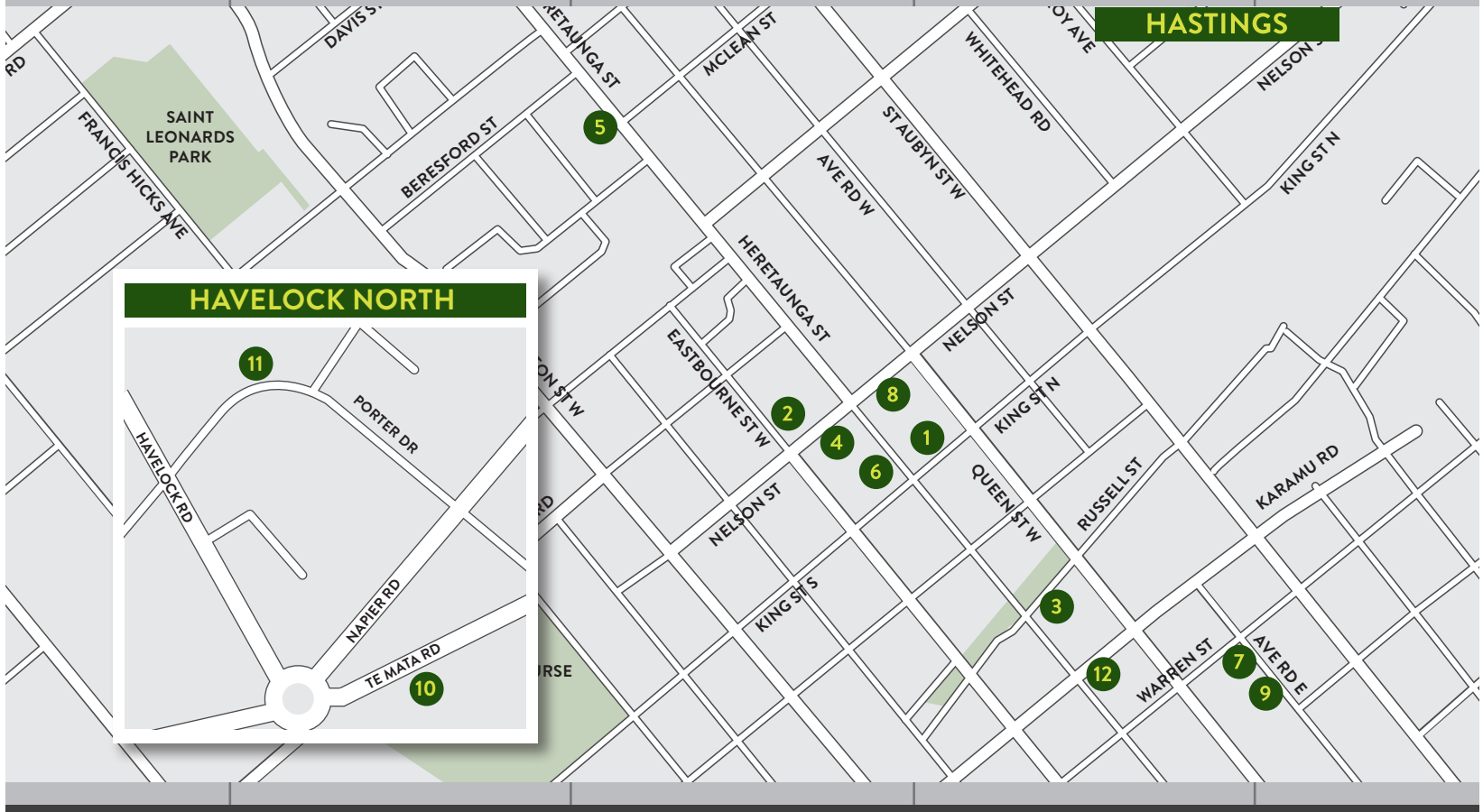

IT'S TIME TO SLOW FASHION DOWN

It's estimated that 4% of the rubbish we're sending to landfill in New Zealand is textiles. Which works out to be around 143,820 tonnes a year and 3,560 tonnes in Hastings and Napier alone!



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According to Greenpeace, global clothing production has more than doubled since 2000. The average person buys 60 per cent more items but keeps them for about half as long as 15 years ago while around only 15 per cent of them are recycled.

Every kilo of clothing that's landfilled creates 3.6 kilos of greenhouse gases. The fashion industry creates about ten per cent of the global CO2 emissions - more than aviation and shipping combined - United Nations.

EXTENDING THE LIFE OF CLOTHES BY JUST NINE EXTRA MONTHS OF ACTIVE USE WOULD REDUCE THEIR CARBON, WATER AND WASTE FOOTPRINTS BY AROUND 20-30 PER CENT EACH - WRAP UK.

TOP TIPS

- Visit your local charity shop, they are filled with second-hand gems.
- Learn how to fix small clothing problems such as replacing buttons or fixing tears, or visit a tailor to save your clothes.
- Avoid the purchase of new clothes and buy pre-loved pieces instead. Why not pledge to make a % of your clothes second hand. Trade me is great place to look and more and more boutique pre-loved clothes stores are popping up.
- Buy less! If you need something then buy good quality garments which will last longer.
- Find ethical retailers online - a better shop could be just around the corner.
- Buy New Zealand-made products that will likely have lower manufacturing and transport emissions.
- Buy natural fibres where possible, a single clothes wash can release about 700,000 plastic particles from the synthetic fibres. Cotton rags can still be used at the end of their life but most synthetic fabrics cant.
- Don't throw unwanted clothes away, ask if friends or family want them first. Otherwise drop them off at a local charity store.
- If you're making a donation make sure your donation is in good condition otherwise you may just be passing a problem onto the op-shops to deal with.
